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1.1 Security Classification

This document is marked as **UNCLASSIFIED** as there are no sensitive details contained in it and it is expressly written to be circulated both internally and externally of the Bermuda Police Service (BPS).

1.2 Data Integrity

The statistics, tables and graphs contained in this document are based on substantiated cases, which are active investigations of an incident that has definitely happened. This is as opposed to using incident data, which is an initial recording of a crime that has yet to be substantiated. The numbers included in this document are therefore not expected to change, however there is always the possibility of mechanical or human error. Data integrity and data collection are both being actively progressed within the BPS to address these issues.

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1.3 Explanation Of Graphs

The graphs used in this report include standard deviation, which has been used as a means of objectively measuring how much the crime rate has varied over time and is useful in identifying extreme highs and lows of crime. Standard deviation has been used so that where the crime rate is above the red line (2 standard deviation above the mean average), it is considered exceptionally high. Where the crime rate is below the blue line (2 standard deviation below the mean average), it is considered exceptionally low. In both cases it can be referred to as statistically significant (high or low) and is an indication of whether the quarterly statistics are exceptionally high or exceptionally low.

1.4 Aim

The aim of this report is to produce accurate, timely, objective information that:

- Enables informed decisions to be made on the types of crime that threatens the safety of the community.
- Is used to proactively manage risks to the island and ensure effective policing, redeploying and directing resources at a strategic and tactical level, as required.
- Facilitates effective and open communication with our stakeholders, developing the means to inform them of the plans, efforts and progress being made by the BPS.
- Provides meaningful information as one of the means of reassuring communities in Bermuda.

1.5 Executive Summary

There were **1,067** offences in Q2 2010 making it the 2nd lowest quarterly crime figure since Q1 2000. It is also so exceptionally low that it is statistically significant in comparison to the previous 5 and the 10 year period.

The high levels of Crimes Against The Person continue to be of concern, particularly the 4 murders in Q2 2010. Firearms incidents are also at an all time high.

Police activity including arrests, calls for service, stop and searches and drug arrests on the street are at all time highs, suggesting that a focus on proactive policing and a reorganisation of the BPS to ensure maximum numbers of officers on the streets is delivering results.

A summary of the 3 key crime headings and 20 crime categories for Q2 2010 in comparison to the previous quarter (Q1 2010), the same quarter last year (Q2 2009) and the 5 year trend is shown below in figure 1:

2. ALL CRIME

2.1 SUMMARY


Figure 2: All Crime (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)

The total for all crime in Q2 2010 decreased by **-118** offences or **-10%** compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has significantly decreased by **-312** offences or by **-23%**. The total for Q2 2010 was 1,067 as can be seen in Figure 2:

2.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of All Crime in Bermuda is stable when compared with the last 5 years. However, All Crime in Bermuda has been decreasing at a steady pace since Q3 2009. Q2 2010 is the lowest quarterly figure for the last 5 year period and is so exceptionally low compared to the last 5 years that it has been identified as being statistically significant. This can be seen in Figure 3, which shows crime for the last 22 quarters, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

3. CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

3.1 SUMMARY

Crimes Against the Person offences in Q2 2010 increased by +6 offences or +3% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has decreased by -32 offences or by -13%. The total for Q2 2010 was 217 as can be seen in Figure 4:

Figure 4: Crimes Against the Person (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)



3.2. TRENDS

The long term trend of Crimes Against The Person is increasing, however with **217** offences in Q2 2010, the most recent figure is only slightly higher than the average over the last 5 year period (which is **209**). The recent increase in Q2 2010 is only slightly higher than Q1 2010 and is much better than the figures recorded between Q2 2009 to Q4 2009, which has fuelled the increase in the long term trend for Crimes Against The Person.

The increase in Q2 2010 compared to Q1 2010 is due to Robberies increasing from 14 to 28 offences, Sexual Assaults from 9 to 17 offences, and Murders from 2 to 4 offences. However, Other Assaults continue to decrease from 146 to 128 offences and Serious Assault decreased from 33 to 29 offences. A summary of Crimes Against The Person for the last 22 quarters can be seen in Figure 5, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

4. CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

4.1. SUMMARY

Crimes Against Property offences in Q2 2010 decreased by -103 offences or -14% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has decreased by -267 offences or by -30%. The total for Q2 2010 was 617 as can be seen in Figure 6:

Figure 6: Crimes Against Property (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)



4.2 TRENDS

Q2 2010 is the lowest recorded quarterly figure for Crimes Against Property since January 2000 and its recent quarter on quarter decrease of **-14%** has made it statistically significant, as it is exceptionally low. The quarterly average for the last 10 years was **966** and so Q2 2010 represents a **-36%** decrease compared to the long term average. This continued decrease in Crime Against Property is the main factor for All Crime now being at the second lowest level for the last 10 years.

The decrease in Q2 2010 is due to decreases in Burglary (Residential, Non Residential and Tourist Accommodation) from **163** to **100** as well as Criminal Damage, Theft Of Property and Fraud & Deception. A summary of Crimes Against Property for the last 22 quarters can be seen in Figure 7, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

5. CRIMES AGAINST THE COMMUNITY

5.1 SUMMARY

Crimes Against The Community offences in Q2 2010 decreased by -21 offences or -8% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has also decreased by -13 offences or by -5%. The total for Q2 2010 was 233 as can be seen in Figure 8:



5.2 TRENDS

Despite Q2 2010 showing a slight decrease from the last two quarters, the long term trend of Crimes Against The Community is increasing. The last 4 quarter average (Q3 2009 - Q2 2010) was **237**, compared to the previous 4 quarter average (Q3 2008 - Q2 2009) which was **201**. The 5 year average was **196** offences.

The Q2 2010 decrease in Crimes Against The Community was due to the decrease in Anti Social Behaviour which went from **177** offences in Q1 2010 to **141** offences in Q2 2010. It was noted that Firearms offences also decreased from **30** offences to **26** offences; however there was an increase in Other Weapon Offences from **16** offences to **24** offences and Disorder Offences also increased from **30** offences to **40** offences. A summary of Crimes Against The Community for the last 22 quarters can be seen in Figure 9, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

6. TRAFFIC COLLISIONS

6.1 SUMMARY

Traffic Collisions include fatal, serious injury, slight injury and damage only collisions. Traffic Collisions in Q2 2010 increased by +118 or +23% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has also increased by +67 or +12%. The total for Q2 2010 was 626 as can be seen below in Figure 10:

Figure 10: Traffic Collisions (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 – Q2 2010)



6.2 TRENDS

Although Traffic Collisions have increased from **508** to **626** in the last 3 months, the long term trend of traffic collisions is on the decrease. To evidence this, the most recent 10 quarters have averaged **588** (Q1 2008 to Q2 2010) compared to **740** for the previous 10 quarter period (Q3 2005 to Q4 2007).

There have been **4** Fatal Collisions in Q2 2010 compared to **2** in Q1 2010. Serious Traffic collisions in Q2 2010 were **47** in comparison to **27** in Q1 2010 and are above the long term average of **37**. Slight Injury Collisions and Damage Only Collisions also increased from Q1 2010 Q2 2010. A summary of Traffic Collisions for the last 20 quarters can be seen in Figure 11, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

7. DRUG ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

Drug Enforcement Activity refers to policing activity against drugs seized at the border, or activity that has led to arrests or seizures in Bermuda.

7.1 SUMMARY

Drug Enforcement Activity in Q2 2010 increased by +81 offences or +41% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has more than doubled with an increase of +169 offences or +152%. The total for Q2 2010 was 280 as can be seen in Figure 12:

Figure 12: Drug Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)



7.2 TRENDS

Drug Enforcement Activity has increased considerably in Q2 2010 and is part of a continual increase since Q4 2008. Q2 2010 is exceptional as it is not only the highest figure for the last 5 years, but is so high that it is also statistically significant.

It is suggested that the high of **280** drug related arrests in Q2 2010 is evidence of a continued improvement in BPS activity in relation to progressing its drugs strategy and a result of a reorganisation of BPS resources to focus increased numbers of officers on the streets. A summary of Drug Enforcement Activity for the last 22 quarters can be seen in Figure 13, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

7.3 Drug Seizures

The Bermuda Police Service continues to work with its partners both locally and overseas to disrupt the trafficking of controlled drugs. These partners include HM Customs Bermuda, U.S. Customs, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and the UK Serious and Organised Crime Agency. This can be seen in Figure 14, which shows Drug Seizures In Bermuda By Location:

As can be seen in Figure 14, the majority of drugs seized are at street level (204) while there were 50 seizures at ports (including LF Wade) and 8 overseas seizures which involved overseas law enforcement agencies. This is a total of 262 seizures for Q2 2010, an increase on Q1 2010 with 199 total seizures.

An estimated total of **57 Kg** of controlled drugs with an estimated street value of **\$4.9 million** was seized in Q2 2010 with Cannabis, the most common drug with **48 Kg** seized at a value of **\$2.4 million**. Cocaine is the second highest drug type seized in terms of value, with **5.9 Kg** seized with a value of **\$1.4 million**. In Q2 2010, **54** cannabis plants were seized, which is more when compared to the **23** plants seized in Q1 2010. It is also higher than the quarterly average of **40**. The type, weight and value of the drugs seized broken down by Port, Street and Overseas seizures can be seen below in Figure 15:

As shown in Figure 15, every drug type has had an increase in the quantity seized in Q2 2010 compared to Q1 2010. Most notably, the amount of cocaine seized has trebled and the amount of cannabis seized has doubled in comparison to the previous guarter.

8. TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

8.1 SUMMARY

Traffic Enforcement Activity in Q2 2010 decreased by -176 or -1% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has increased by +770 or +6%. The total for Q2 2010 was 13,180 as shown below in Figure 16:



8.2 TRENDS

Q2 2010 is the highest Q2 figure since January 2008 and represents a significant shift towards an overall increase in Traffic Enforcement Activity. The average for the last 4 quarters (Q3 2009 – Q2 2010) was **14,121** and by comparison the previous rolling 4 quarter period (Q3 2008 – Q2 2009) had an average of **11,436** indicating a considerable upward trend.

Although Q1 2010 and Q2 2010 have decreased in comparison to the previous two quarters, it reinforces the trend that Traffic Enforcement Activity is increasing. A summary of Traffic Enforcement Activity for the last 10 quarters can be seen in Figure 17, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

9. FIREARM INCIDENTS

Firearm Offences are included within Crimes Against The Community (Section 5); however Firearm Incidents may not necessarily be recorded as a Firearm Offence, as often there is no suspect or even a victim. This section on Firearm Incidents is suggested to be of particular importance in relation to recent high profile gang related violence involving firearms.

To enable accurate recording, analysis and reporting of Firearms Incidents, the BPS classifies them into 5 categories which are split into either **Confirmed** or **Unconfirmed**¹. A confirmed incident is where forensic evidence proves the incident occurred e.g. a firearm has been seized, shell casings/bullets recovered or a person has a gun shot wound.

9.1 SUMMARY

Confirmed Firearm Incidents were unchanged at **17** and Unconfirmed Firearm Incidents increased in Q1 2010 from **35** to **38** in comparison to Q2 2010.

9.2 TRENDS

There were **17** Confirmed Firearm Incidents resulting in **4** fatalities and **6** injuries in Q2 2010 which is much higher than in previous periods. Figure 18 (below) shows injuries and fatalities through firearms since 2004 until the end of Q2 2010. To confirm, the column for 2010 represents *only* Q1 and Q2 2010, while the other columns represent whole years of Firearm Incidents:

As shown in Figure 18, there has been a marked increase in Firearm Incidents since Q1 2009. Although the most serious figures are those relating to the number of incidents where persons have been shot² (**6** persons killed and **14** injured), there has also been an increase in gun shots heard. This is where a report of a gunshot has been reported to the Police, however on arrival officers cannot substantiate the claim and there is no forensic evidence to prove that a firearm was discharged.

There were **18** Firearm Incidents classified as 'Claims Of Gunshots Heard' in Q2 2010, which when added to the **23** incidents in Q1 2010, totals **41** so far in 2010. By comparison, during the 6 year period of Q1 2004 to Q4 2009, there were only **34** such incidents recorded. This increase in reporting gunshots may be as a result of heightened concerns by the public who are reporting any sound similar to a gunshot, as much as

actual firearm discharges. It may also demonstrate a greater willingness to report such incidents to the Police.




Figure 19: Firearm Incidents In Bermuda (2004 - 2010)

The long term trend of Firearm Incidents is increasing, and at a substantial rate. To evidence this, Figure 19 (below) shows Firearm Reports since 2004 until the end of Q2 2010. To confirm, the column for 2010 represents *only* Q1 and Q2 2010, while the other columns represent whole years of Firearm Incidents:

As can be seen from Figure 19, Firearm Incidents for the first half of 2010 are already higher than in any year between 2004 and 2009. The **34** Confirmed Firearm Incidents and **72** Unconfirmed Firearm Incidents for Q1 and Q2 2010 combined, compare unfavourably with the **37** Confirmed Firearm Incidents and **50** Unconfirmed Firearm Incidents in all of 2009.

10. INCIDENTS - CALLS FOR SERVICE

10.1 SUMMARY


Figure 20: Incidents - (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)

Incidents refer to all police activity and also to calls for service that have been recorded on the police computer system (New World System). Incidents in Q2 2010 increased by +869 or +9% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 also showed an increase of +143 or +1%. The total for Q2 2010 was 10,260 as shown in Figure 20:

10.2 TRENDS

Q2 2010 is the highest quarterly figure since January 2005 and represents a significant shift towards an overall increase in policing activity and calls for service. The average for the last 18 months (Q1 2009 to Q2 2010) was **9,847** incidents per quarter which is very favourable when compared to the previous 4 year period (Q3 2005 to Q4 2008) with an average of **6,512** incidents. This reinforces the high rate of police activity which now appears to be settling above 10,000 incidents per quarter. This can be seen in Figure 21, which shows All Calls for Incidents for the last 20 quarters, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

11. ARRESTS - ALL OFFENCES

11.1 SUMMARY


Figure 22: Arrests - All Offences (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)

Arrests refer to those persons arrested and brought into police custody. Arrests in Q2 2010 increased by +23 or +2% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to the same period last year (Q2 2009), Q2 2010 has also increased by +268 or +25%. The total for Q2 2010 was 1,323 as shown in Figure 22:

11.2 TRENDS

During the 4 quarters of 2008, arrests remained stable until Q1 2009 from where they have continually risen to a high of **1,323** in Q2 2010. Arrests dropped by **9** in Q1 2010 then rose by **23** in Q2 2010. Q2 2010 was recorded as the highest quarter for arrests since Q1 2008. The average figure for arrests over the last 5 years is **1,043** per quarter and the last 4 rolling quarters has an average of **1,299** which reinforces the evidence that the BPS is focusing its efforts on arresting more offenders. As in previous reports, it is suggested that this increase is due to PACE³, BPS reorganisation and a greater emphasis on proactive policing tactics and strategy. A summary of arrests for the last 10 quarters can be seen in Figure 23, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

³ Police And Criminal Evidence Act (2006) was implemented on 7th September 2008. From this date, any offence that carried 3 months imprisonment or more was automatically an arrestable offence, increasing and simplifying the number of offences you can be arrested for.

11.3 GENDER

Of the 1,323 persons arrested in Q2 2010, 1,095 were male and 228 were female.

11.4 AGE

Analysis of persons arrested by age revealed that individuals from 26 to 35 years of age were arrested more frequently than any other age group (377), followed closely by those aged 18 to 25 (367). A breakdown of persons arrested by their age group can be seen below in Figure 24:

11.5 NATIONALITY

Of the **1,323** persons arrested in Q2 2010 **1,221** were Bermudian and **102** were foreign nationals. This is similar to previous quarters.

11.6 ETHNICITY

The majority of individuals arrested were black (1,183), with 113 individuals being white. In addition, 4 of those arrested were Asian, 4 individuals fall into the category 'black and white', 1 individual falls under the category 'black and other', 2 individual falls under the category 'white and other' and 16 individuals fall into the category 'other'. This is also similar to arrest figures in previous quarters. A breakdown of persons arrested by their ethnicity can be seen below in Figure 25:

11.7 TYPE OF ARREST

Of the **1,323** persons arrested in Q2 2010, the most common category was 'all other offences' which includes HMC, apprehension, SJA and civil warrants with **647**. There were **14** arrests for murder and **13** arrests for firearm offences in Q2 2010. A breakdown of the offences persons were arrested for can be seen overleaf in Figure 26:

11.8 RECIDIVISM

Of the **1,323** persons arrested in Q2 2010, **148** individuals were arrested more than once and accounted for **317** of the arrests for this period. These included **3** offenders who were arrested **4** times or more.

12. STOP AND SEARCHES⁴

12.1 SUMMARY


Figure 27: Stop and Searches (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q2 2009 - Q2 2010)

Stop and Searches in Q2 2010 increased by +680 or +66% compared to Q1 2010. In comparison to Q2 2009, Q2 2010 has increased by +1,037. or +155%. The total for Q2 2010 was 1,708 as can be seen in Figure 27:

11.2 TRENDS

Similar to the recod high in arrests, call for service and drug seziures on the street, the record number of Stop and Searches is suggested to be a mixture of proactive policing where more officers are on the streets in combination with the use of 315F Authorities which gives officers additional powers to utilise Stop and Search powers. This can be seen in Figure 28, showing Stop and Searches for the last 7 quarters, with Q2 figures highlighted in boxes:

⁴ Stop and Searches refers to the activity of Police Officers utilising their powers to stop and search a person where lawfully justified under PACE (2006), Criminal Code, Misuse of Drugs Act etc. These searches are conducted where there is reasonable grounds to suspect that the person has committed or is about to commit an arrestable offence and they are carried out with courtesy, consideration and respect for the individual being stopped. It provides an indication as to police activity, particularly in regards to patrolling in the community. PACE was implemented on 7th September 2008 and since then this policing activity has been specifically recorded.
